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### Common-Pool Resource Management

Common-pool resource management is the management of a common resource or issue by a community through the collective action of volunteers and stakeholders. Viewing transitions in care as a common-pool resource can help communities achieve avoidable hospital readmission reduction goals by providing a self-governing group focused on the same target of creating an engaged patient and a community of healthcare providers focused on improving the quality of patient care.

#### Use of Antipsychotic Medications-Side Effects or Resident Behavior? (NH L&AN) Karen Moeller, PharmD

Side effects of antipsychotic medication in the elderly population can be masked by many different behaviors and therefore difficult to determine if the behavior is natural or drug related. Dr. Moeller will discuss how to identify medicinal side effects versus human behavior and how to recognize the difference.
